Historical Society

Come to our October dinner meeting to marvel at the mysteries of the oldest farm in the Mohawk Valley. The program will uncover the story of the Mabee Farm, a 300 year old farmstead located in Rotterdam Junction. Founded in 1705, it is a site that is not only rich in history, but also surrounded by a cloud of myths and mysteries.

From the weathered pine floors in the home of settlers Jan and Annetje, to the hand-pegged Dutch barn, to the site's elusive 1600's fur trading post, what mysteries lay buried beneath the soil of Mabee Farm? Archaeology, research, and determination help us answer some questions—many more remain unsolved mysteries.

Michael Diana grew up in Guilderland and has long been fascinated with the natural and historic landscape of the Mohawk Valley. After attending Hamilton College, he returned to Schenectady where he currently works as the Programs and Education Manager at the Schenectady County Historical Society.

GARDEN TALK – By Paul Zimmermann (Past MGCA President) The Dreaded Japanese Knotweed

My beloved wife donates much of her free time to maintaining the town park near our home. It's a thankless task, but she bravely battles the insidious weeds that constantly encroach on the periphery of the park. Many of these green devils such as poison ivy, black swallow wort and Virginia creeper, provide many hours of weeding pleasure. However, the ultimate Godzilla of weeds, Japanese knotweed, provides no such gaiety.

If Japanese knotweed was indicted, here's a list of its high crimes.

- 1. Spreading uninvited into private and public properties
- 2. Displaying aggressive behavior towards native plant species
- 3. Damaging asphalt and concrete
- 4. Failure to take no for an answer

Japanese knotweed often invades disturbed soil beside roadways and stream banks. It can spread via seeds, rhizomes, or cuttings. Once established it requires heroic effort to eradicate. Difficult and tedious, but not impossible.



Your first task will be to provide positive identification (no DNA kit required). Here are some key identification keys:

- 1. Stems of mature specimens are hollow but not woody
- 2. Leaves are arranged on the stem in a zig-zag pattern
- 3. Leaves are oval in shape with flat bottoms. Young leaves have strong reddish tinge.

GARDEN TALK – By Paul Zimmermann (Past MGCA President) - continued The Dreaded Japanese Knotweed



Several techniques have been used to eradicate Japanese knotweed. Let's review them here.

- 1. Digging. Great exercise, poor results. The roots can go down as deep as 6 feet and spread laterally as many as 20 feet.
- 2. Herbicides. Good results, but multiple applications are needed to complete the job. Many people inherently dislike spraying large quantities of herbicides but it is an effective technique. Be sure to follow the directions for application of the herbicide. You can also directly inject herbicides into the knotweed stem (search the internet for articles covering this technique).
- 3. Persistent trimming. Over time (and the emphasis here is time), you can weaken the knotweed, but much patience and ongoing effort is required. Be sure to bag the cuttings carefully as they can be the source of new infestations.

For most folks, I recommend herbicides.

Like politicians, Japanese knotweed has a small (very small) upside. Its spring shoots can be eaten like asparagus. Also like politicians, knotweed should be eliminated early in its career before it poisons the ecosphere.


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
