#### GARDEN TALK – By Paul Zimmermann (Past MGCA President) Leaves Enrich the Soil, Don't They?

It's fall, and you're wondering how to bed down your garden for the winter. And you're curious – are leaves alone good enough to enrich your soil without additions such as rock dust, compost, and lime?

We'll explore these questions in the paragraphs that follow. But first, let me add a disclaimer. If you have compost available to add to your garden, then by all means proceed and apply. A two inch layer will do wonders for soil fertility and tilth. Add a 6 inch layer of leaves on top of the compost and you're in double heaven.

But are leaves by themselves sufficient to do the job? To answer this weighty question I headed off into the Internet and found a very interesting article that seems to answer many of the most pressing questions. Here's the link in case you want to read the article yourself -

Due to the plethora of fools, frauds and selfpromoters that gravitate to the world's biggest waste disposal site, you need to sift through the available material with a very skeptical attitude. The article quoted here was based on research done by Rutgers University and is science based. Always be wary of your sources (especially social media).

So back to our original question – do leaves provide significant level of nutrients to the soil? I filched a summary table from the above mentioned article.

# GARDEN TALK – By Paul Zimmermann (Past MGCA President) Leaves Enrich the Soil, Don't They? Continued

As you can see, the answer is an emphatic YES! Not only do leaves provide primary nutrients such as nitrogen, phosphorous, potassium, sulfur, calcium, etc., but also contain trace elements such as copper, iron, boron and the like.

But there's a caveat. If you look at the carbon and nitrogen lines in the table, you can see that the average ratio between carbon and nitrogen is 47:1. This is not ideal (compost, for example, has a 25:1 CN ratio) and means that when the leaves are being broken down there will be a nitrogen deficiency as the microorganisms feeding on the leaves take up all available nitrogen for their own growth.

To sidestep this problem, I pull aside the leaves from my raised beds about a week before planting and then add a mild nitrogen source after planting. I then use the left-over leaves as mulch later in the summer to suppress weeds and keep the top layer of soil from drying out. If I am not planting in certain portions of the garden then I just leave the leaves in place.

Bottom line - leaves are a great (and inexpensive) source of

The meeting was called to order at 7:40 by President **Don Lewis**.

The Treasurer's report was approved as presented by our Treasurer, **Paul Hughes**. As of October 31, 1989 there was a total balance on hand in the General Fund of \$1,622.74 (1988 it was \$3,989.08). In the Memorial Fund there was a balance of \$4,590.02. The Certificate of Deposit will mature on November 15 at \$5,511.45, which shows an interest growth of \$244,45. The Board instructed **Paul** to transfer the earned interest to our General Fund account and to renew the Certificate at \$5,267.

Membership: Our total paid membership stands at 120.




