GARDEN TALK – By Paul Zimmermann (Past MGCA President)
Sweet Potatoes in the Home Garden

Growing sweet potatoes isn't difficult and often rewarding.

The first requirement is plenty of space. Sweet potato vines grow vigorously and will occupy considerable amount of your precious garden space (you can find “short vine” varieties that reduce the required acreage). Secondly, you're going to need a bit of luck to get good yields in Northern gardens. The sweet potato, grown as an annual, actually is a semi-tropical perennial. Good yields require 4 to 5 months of warm/hot weather. A good strategy to assist your delicate potato vines is to cover the planting area with black plastic.

A third requirement for these fussy vegetables is a reasonable loose, friable soil. Dense, clay-like soils will produce sweet potato fingers rather than robust tubers. Mounding the soil prior to planting will help provide more space for the tubers to expand.

Needless to say, full sun and rich soil produce higher yields. If you can, modify the acidity of your soil to a pH in the range of 5.5 to 6.5. If you have relatively fertile soil, fertilization during the growing season probably isn't necessary. If you insist, go easy on the nitrogen least you end up with all vine and little potato. Using mulch (plastic or otherwise) will keep down weeds.

Most gardeners procure their slips from mail-order firms because they offer more varieties. Three varieties you might consider are Georgia Jet, Vardaman, Beauregard, and Jewel. I prefer Beauregard because it matures in as little as 3 months.


When planting time arrives (perhaps 4 weeks after the last frost-free day), plant the slips about 30 inches apart. Keep well watered.

When the vines begin to die back, it's time to harvest. Avoid delaying this chore – a damp, cold soil can result in severely reduced storage time. Gently lift the tubers out of their home with a pitchfork, handling them with kid gloves. If you wish to store your tender tubers, cure them 2 to 3 weeks in a warm, moist location. I just eat them.

A final note – avoid planting sweet potatoes in the same garden location for the following 3 to 5 years.
