

GARDEN TALK – By Paul Zimmermann (Past MGCA President) The Hemlock Wooly Adelgid

This month's nominee for nasty little sap sucker award is the Hemlock Wooly Adelgid. Closely related to the beloved aphid, the Wooly Adelgid threatens hemlocks across the Eastern United States, particularly (but not limited to) the southern Appalachian Mountains. Although I really don't need to say this, but like the Asian Longhorn Beetle and the Emerald Ash Borer, these little buggers are imports from East Asia.

Less than a millimeter in length, the Wooly Adelgid sucks sap from its hapless victims while injecting a toxin at the same time. Over time (4 to 10 years) the infected hemlock (size is immaterial) loses vigor, turns a pale green, and often dies. The easiest way to detect an infestation is to look for the egg sacks which resemble cotton candy (See photo below).



Many people may not be aware that the hemlock is more than a landscaping ornamental, but an important member of the Northeast forest family. In Vermont hemlocks are the third most populous tree. Hemlocks serve as food and shelter for wildlife as well as an important lumber tree. There are four basic approaches to battling Wooly Adelgid infestations.

- 1. Spray with insecticidal soap or horticultural oil. These applications will suffocate the Wooly Adelgid and would work well for the homeowner with small hemlock specimens.
- 2. Soil drenches that are absorbed through the tree roots.
- 3. Direct injections into the hemlock. Like drenches, injections most likely need to be repeated each year.
- 4. Biological controls like a black lady beetle (*Sasajiscymnus tsugae*) an import from Japan where it is a natural predator of the Wooly Adelgid. The larvae of the black lady beetle perform the handiwork, consuming eggs and larvae of the Wooly Adelgid.

Populations of the Wooly Adelgid can be significant reduced by prolonged cold snaps. Unfortunately with climate moderation in our future, it appears the Wooly Adelgid's happy hunting grounds will be expanding ever northward. Let's hope their enemies can move along with them.

<u>Program Committee</u>: January 25 - At Tom Sawyer on Route 20 in Guilderland. The price is set at \$15.00. The guest speaker will be **Paul Winkeller**, Coordinator for New York State Community Gardens. Full details will be found in the Dirt.

We are still having a problem of some people who don't show up for dinner after they have made reservations. These people will be charged in the future.

OTHER BUSINESS

- 1. A motion was made and carried to order 20 National Brochures on The Introduction of new members to the activities of Men's Garden Clubs of America.




Along with perennials, shrubs and trees, there is also a plaque that lists the names of our club members who have passed away in recent years.
