PROGRAM: Shannon's talk, *Backyard Wildlife, Ticks, and Lyme Disease*, will cover the ways that encouraging wildlife can protect people from Lyme and other tick-borne diseases. She'll also be available to answer general questions on ticks, Lyme disease, and current recommendations for staying tick-safe outdoors.

Shannon Duerr is a Senior Research Specialist with the Cary Institute of Ecosystem Studies in Millbrook, NY. A graduate of SUNY Environmental Science and Forestry, she has nearly 20 years of experience researching tick ecology and Lyme disease with the lab of Dr. Richard Ostfeld. Notable findings from the Ostfeld lab include the discovery that acorns can predict Lyme disease risk, that forest fragmentation increases the risk of Lyme disease, and that opossums may reduce tick numbers. Shannon is currently Study Coordinator for The Tick Project, investigating whether neighborhood-level tick control can protect people from Lyme and other tick-borne diseases.

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
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Membership - Tom Baker June 19, 1928 - September 28, 2020

Tom Baker grew up in Seneca Falls as the 12th of 14 Children



They had a nice home, on a corner lot, with trees that Tom loved to climb and lots of open land for their Victory Garden.

Years later he helped us build a Victory garden down where the USS Slater is docked in Albany,

Tom was kind, intelligent, and generous with his time and talent

and was someone that everyone gravitated toward.

Tom dedicated his life to helping others in so many ways.

And when Tom said he was going to do something - he did it - A few examples are:

- Christ was Tom's highest priority and he spent countless hours supporting the Christ The King church for 34 years -
- Tom Volunteered at Our Lady of Mercy nursing home every Thursday morning for 34 years.
- Tom was a Co-founder of the Men's Garden Club Of Albany's Gardening From The Heart program at the Center for Disability Services

He taught gardening every Wednesday morning for 35 years -1750 classes

- Now there is a greenhouse and 30 raised beds that are wheelchair accessible.
- The students really loved to see him and they would be sad if he missed a Wednesday. Some had a smile that said it all others would shake his hand or even get a kick out of wiggling Tom's hat.
 - As the MGCA Secretary Tom documented monthly minutes for 35 years all digitized on a computer.
 - We held an annual bulb sale to raise money for the Berkshire Botanical Gardens. Tom would help packaging and selling up to 10,000 flower bulbs.

- He always brought individually folded plastic grocery bags for the customers purchases. - 35 years
- The Men's Garden Club of Albany held an Annual plant sale to raise money for our Memorial fund
 - O Tom was the guy that arranged permission to use the lot for our sale, notified the police and Town hall of our planned sale. He did that for 35 years

Tom helped with many Men's Garden of Albany projects - such as:

- Memorial tree plantings
- helping Judges at the State Fair
- building our raised beds for the Adopt A Highway program (1994 and 2004)
- planting at the Albany International Airport
- working at local fairs such as the Altamont fair
- helping with our annual picnic / memorial services
- Tom was one of the original builders of our Memorial Garden at the Albany County Cooperative Extension
- Regional Director representing MGCA to the national organization
- Tom taught Swim classes for 21 years at the Level 5 (highest level)
- In 1953, and after being a musician in the 1st Army Division Band. and spending a year in Okinawa as a musician playing the French Horn he applied for a job as a music teacher in Voorheesville, NY Tom took a Greyhound bus to Albany and tried to get a taxi to Voorheesville, NY Well that wasn't easy eventually someone said hop in think we can find it. Tom was nervous about getting to the interview on time.

He made it and he got the job and stayed there until he retired 30 years later.

- He was advised not to go drink his lunch at Smitty's and he never went there until after he retired. I don't think he ever drank so that really wasn't an issue.
- On Rt. 155 they were building the Heritage Village apartments. Tom decided that he wanted to live there and each day after work he would stop by and tell the contractors to do a good job because he was going to move in when it was completed.
 - Tom lived in the same apartment for 50 years.
- Tom and fellow teacher Joe Herman started going out to Berne every year for the annual Election day dinner that included 'Real" mashed potatoes. I thought he told me that they haven't missed a year in the past 50 years.- whatever the number was it was huge.

Tom had a great interest in Genealogy and he wrote very accurate and detailed info about everyone except himself

- The only other person I know that had such detail in their Genealogy records was my Grandfather Carroll Greenman (Past Men's Garden Club of Albany President).
- Tom was one of 14 children 6 of which he never met until Monday (9/28/2020)
 - \circ Diphtheria, Polio, burns and the Spanish flu (~ 100 yeas ago) were some of the causes of their early death.
 - o As detailed as Tom's records were, the "note" field for Tom was blank. Last year we sat at his computer and finished his genealogy.

That is only a small portion of what Tom accomplished in his 92 years here on earth.

His friendship may be his greatest gift to us.

My wife would often invite him over for dinner - with Real mashed potatoes - and it was such a treat to be able to spend time together. I don't know how he did it - but he could pack away a lot of food - especially those "Real" mashed potatoes.

Since I first met him in 1987- I have never heard anyone complain about Tom and Tom never had a word to say that wasn't positive.

Tom would always say - everything is "Wonderful"

Tom was a great role model and teacher that was loved by all.

Baker, Thomas E. GUILDERLAND Thomas E. Baker, 92, formerly of Seneca Falls, N.Y., died peacefully on Monday, September 28, 2020, at his home at Atria Guilderland. He was a music teacher, active volunteer, friend, and faithful follower of Christ. Tom was born on June 19, 1928, the 12th of 14 children, many not surviving childhood, born to William and Belinda Mary (Ford) Baker in Waterloo, N.Y. He is survived by his brother, Charles (Chuck) Baker; his nephews, Martin Knapp and Gregory Knapp; his cousin, Mary Beth Stowell, and countless friends who became family. Tom's childhood home of Seneca Falls was the model for Bedford Falls in the Christmas classic film, It's a Wonderful Life, and he believed he lived a wonderful life.

Membership - Tom Baker June 19, 1928 - September 28, 2020 continued His musical family attended Catholic church masses in the closely-knit town where he played in school bands and in Wayne Guy's Orchestra dance band. He graduated from Mvnderse Academy in 1948. Tom received a bachelor's degree in arts from Fredonia State Teachers College in 1950, and a master's degree in 1952. He was drafted into the Army, where he spent a year in Texas as a French horn musician in the 1st Army Division Band before being sent to Okinawa, Japan. He became a music teacher in the Voorheesville Central School District in 1953, first in all grade levels and then in the elementary school, until retiring in 1983. He taught band and vocal groups and directed school musical performances. Students and parents often reminisced with him. Tom was an avid downhill skier known for his love of snow days. Tom was a member of the Board of Directors and Secretary of the Men's Garden Club of Albany, where he co-organized and taught three decades of weekly indoor hands-on gardening classes for adults and children at the Center for Disability Services in Albany. For 21 years, he taught Red Cross adult swimming classes at SUNY Albany. He assisted patients attending church services at Our Lady of Mercy nursing home from 1985-2019. He also sang many years in the Albany area Festival Chorus, a joint ecumenical choir of 40 choirs. In 2018, he won the Annual Senior Lifetime Achievement Award for his extensive community volunteerism. He was a lay minister at Christ the King, Guilderland, where he was an enthusiastic weekly greeter at two worship services, a Garden Committee member, Bereavement Committee choir member, and visitation minister. He also attained the Third Degree in Knights of Columbus at Christ the King, where his many communities appreciated his warmth and cheerful spirit. Tom would like to thank his many friends, especially Greg and Diane Stevens, Russ and Maria Greenman, Christ the King visitation ministers, and the staff at Atria Guilderland for their continued love and support. All made his life exceptionally wonderful. Viewing hours are on Saturday, October 3, from 10-11 a.m. in Christ the King Church, 20 Sumter Ave., Albany. The Mass of Christian Burial will be at 11 a.m. Interment in St. Patrick's Cemetery, Geneva, will follow. Masks and social distancing are required. GARDEN TALK – By Paul Zimmermann (Past MGCA President) Plant Nutrients

People (include me in that list) often become confused when considering plant nutrients. Perhaps this quick article will provide some sunshine.

Plants require about 15 nutrients to make happy. Some, oxygen, carbon, and nitrogen, are worry free – they come from the air and water. The remainder must be present in the soil. Not just present actually, but available. And in sufficient quantity.

Let's first talk about macronutrients. For the fertilizer savvy, these are represented by the familiar NPK designation you see on fertilizer bags. N is for nitrogen, P is for phosphorous, and K for potassium. Plants really need them, although in different quantities depending on the plant species and soil characteristics. Hence the macro designation.

You might see the designation 10-5-4 on a bag of fertilizer. This means that 10% of the bag's content (by weight) is nitrogen, 5% phosphorous, and 4% potassium. A typical bag of lawn fertilizer runs in the range of 30-0-4 (many states have banned phosphorous in lawn fertilizer because the phosphorous runoff causes algae blooms in streams and lakes). As you can see, grass really adores nitrogen. Use the same fertilizer in your vegetable garden and you may end up with all plant and little fruit.

The nutrients in a bag of Scotts are manufactured and combined into (usually) slow release pellets. You can also feed plants from organic sources – manure, leaves, compost for example. Since nutrient release from these sources depend on microorganisms to break down the organic material into a form usable by plants, you can more or less rest assured that the plants won't be assailed with large doses over a short time frame (this rule doesn't hold if you happen to live in the Amazon jungle). For grass, it's hard to beat the artificial stuff – very few organic sources contain the same huge dose of nitrogen (not to mention the time savings). Outside of the lawn however, homeowners and gardeners should consider organic sources first because they improve the structure of the soil and don't leave behind salt residues that eventually degrade the soil. Although NPK get most of the attention, the other required nutrients (the micronutrients) can't be forgotten least you foment revolution in the garden. Included in this pantheon of less renown elements are sulfur, magnesium, calcium (also called secondary nutrients), zinc, boron, chlorine, molybdenum, iron, copper, and manganese. The best source of these nutrients? You guessed it – organic material.

Deficiencies of these micronutrients can be as severe as shortfalls in their macronutrient brethren. For example, plants that lack sufficient sulfur exhibit pale green chlorosis – the whole plant loses it deep green coloration.

Which leads to my final thought. Although you no doubt tire of me harping on this topic, I simply can't neglect to prod you to have a soil analysis done. Knowing your baseline will allow you to address the actual deficiencies, not the imagined ones. In the picture below, note the NPK for a 'natural nitrogen fertilizer'. Fortunately the ingredients are hand crafted, which makes all the difference.






