

Forcing Tree & Shrub Branches for Indoor Bloom

I don't know about you, but I'm more than ready for a little taste of Spring and look forward to seeing those beautiful bursts of yellow flowers on our local forsythia shrubs each year. Wouldn't it be nice if you could enjoy them now though, inside your home on a dark snowy day!! Let me tell you how that is possible...

This age-old practice called "Forcing Tree & Shrub Branches" brings bursts of spectacular color and the beauty of mother nature's blooms inside to chase away those "Winter Blahs". Here's how I do it and a few examples of some of the trees and shrubs that I feel work best for doing so and how many weeks as indicated {example-Forsythia (1 wk)} for how long they take to flower once you bring them inside.

All you really need is a good pair of nice sharp hand pruners and a spring-flowering tree or shrub willing to make the sacrifice of a few non-essential branches. No special expertise is required. You'll be pruning out a few non-essential branches so don't worry about hurting your plant.

These are the trees and shrubs that I recommend you start with and the number in parenthesis is the approximate number of weeks it should take from the time you cut the branches until they should bloom for you. One caution though, don't try to fool Mother Nature too much...branches need at least six weeks of Winter's cold temperatures before they can be brought inside and forced into bloom.

Forsythia (1 wk) branches could have been brought inside anytime in the last couple of weeks and still are my first choice this time of year to be forced into bloom. It's now time to also try your luck at Redbuds (2 wks), Cherry Trees (4 wks) and Red Maples (2 wks). Wait until the end of this month (February) to consider Lilacs (4 wks), Crab Apple (4 wks), Honeysuckle (3 wks), Spirea (4 wks) and various Magnolias (3 wks).

Another option is using Pussy Willows since they are a great choice for forcing indoors, they don't require water and can last for weeks (be sure to wait until the soft downy catkins have started to break out of their castings.)

HOW TO PRUNE BRANCHES – Choose a day when the temperature is above freezing to cut your branches since the milder temp helps ease the transition the plants must make from outside to inside. Be sure to choose branches that are not essential to the pleasing form of the plant or in an overgrown section or toward the back of the plant where it won't be missed. Choose a branch with lots of small buds that are swollen and beginning to open and be sure to make proper pruning cuts just above a node at the proper angle to ensure water uptake.

HOW TO FORCE BRANCHES -

• Once you get your freshly cut branches inside, place them in a container of room temperature water overnight. Some people like to crush the bottom half inch ends of the branches to help with quicker water uptake. Make sure the container is wide and heavy enough to keep branches from tipping over.



- Keep them in a well-lit location away from heaters and direct sun. The brighter the location, the better the quality of bloom will be.
- Change the water every few days so the branches don't begin to rot. Misting the flower buds helps as well. Once they begin to open, display them in a warm area and sit back and enjoy your little taste of Spring. If it doesn't work the first time don't despair, just cut a few branches a week later and try again!

History – 30 years ago – by Mr. Tom Baker MEN'S GARDEN CLUB OF ALBANY BOARD OF DIRECTORS MONTHLY MEETING FEBRUARY 7, 1991

The Regular Monthly Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Men's Garden Club of Albany, was held on Thursday evening, February 7, 1991 in the Cerebral Palsy Center for the Disabled.

President **Joe Raggio** called the meeting to order at 7:38.

The Minutes of the January 3, 1991 meeting were approved as read by the Club Secretary, **Tom Baker**

The Treasurer's Report was approved as presented by our newly elected Treasurer, **Fred Day**. There as a balance in the General Fund as of January 31, 1991 of \$4,937,61 and in the Memorial Fund \$742.29, the endowment and Investment fund has \$5,987.63.

A letter was read from the Berkshire Garden Center thanking the Club for its generous annual contribution.

From the National Endowment and Investment fund Committee, **Al Miller** informed the Board that his one year appointment expired on December 31, 1990 where as the National Board elected to have **Al** serve a full three year term. **Al** consented to accept. (Was this National?)

The bulk of the remainder of the meeting consisted of working on the committees, chairmen, co-chairmen, and their responsibilities. Everyone had a copy of the agenda, therefore, the Secretary elected not to reiterate the entire details. The agenda is attached.

SOME PROPOSALS WERE MADE:

- 1. **Ferd Johnson** and **Ken York** will chair the committee for Investigation of Club expansion.
- 2. Alternate Directory to replace the present Directory will be chaired by **Don Lewis**.

OLD BUSINESS:

- 1. **Andy Cytrynak** discussed the plans for the Flower Show. For one thing, **Warren Abele** will give a workshop on Forcing Daffodils.
- 2. **Edgar Tompkins** made a motion which was carried that would allocate \$150.00 for the Show: \$125.00 is for the entrance fee and \$25.00 incidental expenses.
- 3. Oscar Rheingold offered to donate some Tuberous Begonias for the Exhibit.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:00.






