

Youth Gardening - on a BIG scale Bill Stoneman's <u>The Vegetable Project</u>

Club members Joseph Raggio, Greg Goutos and Russ Greenman spent the day on Monday, March 7, at Stephen and Harriet Myers Middle School in Albany shepherding 125 students through turning plastic milk jugs into miniature greenhouses. And what a phenomenal day it was, supporting kids and connecting with them around growing plants. The greenhouse project, which will visit a number of Albany City Schools in the weeks ahead, is an initiative of the Vegetable Project in Albany, NY, which is led by club member Bill Stoneman.







Club members and other volunteers guided students in drilling holes in the top and bottom of the milk jugs, to allow rain in and excess water to drain out; making a horizontal cut in the milk jugs, to allow opening it; placing potting mix into the bottom

portion of the jug; placing seeds on top of the potting mix; and then taping the jug closed; and moving it outdoors.

GARDEN TALK – Dave Jennings, Master Gardener

Why you should have Houseplants in the new "Work from Home" Office

It's a well-known fact that people breathe in Oxygen and exhale Carbon Dioxide. Many of us have chosen or been required to work from home and plants "breathe" in that Carbon Dioxide and release oxygen as part of photosynthesis making us great partners with houseplants. A great way for this partnership to work is to fill your home office with a variety of houseplants that have lower light requirements such as Dracaenas, Pothos, Philodendrons, many Succulents, a few Cactus, Snake Plants, Rex or Angel Wing Begonias, <u>Peperomia</u> and Bromeliads because most homes don't have enough light for other types of plants to thrive.



Houseplants help to clean and clear the air; they often reduce noise levels by buffering sounds; they add much needed moisture in the winter thus increasing the humidity through transpiration and have been known to reduce the level of airborne toxins in closed small areas. Almost all of us working from home or isolating in place now have felt the benefit of having plants all around us and have experienced their calming effect. Some are slowly returning to work now and want their workplaces to also have that homey feel and are bringing their newfound friends (their plants) back to work with them. Many businesses have again started to appreciate the value of providing small desktop plants in the office which results in happier employees.

Walk into any office lobby and see it with all its splendor of large, lush greenery, then picture it without any plants you will most certainly experience the difference plants properly placed can make. The color of the greenery is noted for having an overall calming and relaxing effect (thus reducing stress, anxiety and often depression as well) in the wide-open areas and/or as small desktop plants. Numerous plants in a work atmosphere can help us concentrate better, help us to connect better with nature, increase productivity & creativity and are helpful in so many other ways. Recent University studies have reported that enhancing the environment with the addition of plants has decreased anger issues and depression rates as well as increasing productivity and lowering absenteeism. As we all know it's so important to keep employees happy, healthy & inspired and something as simple as plants on their desks go a long way in achieving these goals. Indoor landscaping (on any scale) plays a major role in helping to balance our lives. One final benefit is in helping to attract qualified job applicants. Everything we can do for this is so important in this time of high demand and short supply as Gen Z individuals are entering the job market earlier than any generation before them.

The meeting was called to order by President, **Joe Huth** at 7:35, with 10 club members present. The Minutes of the February 5, 1987 meeting were approved as read by the Club Secretary, Tom Baker.

The Treasurer's Report was approved as read by Al Miller in the absence of Paul Hughes, the Club Treasurer. As of February 28, 1987, in the General Fund, there was a total balance on hand of \$2,409.03, also, the total balance in the Key Advantage Account was \$5,343.94. Al Miller reminded the group that the Executive Committee Meeting to be held in Atlanta, Georgia, on November 6-7 is open to all Club members. Call Al for more information. Bob Ireland, Chairman of the Membership Committee reported that our total membership is at 94. We also have two new Live Members, Charles Buchanan and Bill Robinson. This brings our grand total up to 27 Life Members.

Ferd Johnson acting Program Chairman told us that the next Regular Meeting would be at Vedeers, Dutch Treat Happy Hour at 6:00 pm and dinner at 7:00 pm. The entrees will be Lamb and Scrod at \$10.00. The guest Speaker will be **Bob Duff**, Master Gardener from the Rensselaer County Co-operative Extension, whose topic will be "Solar Greenhouses." Lee Negus reported that as in the past, seeds for the Big Pumpkins, Spirit Pumpkins, Giant Sunflowers and Sweet One Hundred Tomatoes will also be given out, as well as packets of Zinnias, Marigolds and Nasturtium. Lee is still interested in expanding Youth Gardening, possibly by having our members sponsor a youth who is interested gardening.

Don Gwinn gave an interesting report on the progress of the Gardening From the Heart project at the C P Center for the Disabled. Details in the Dirt.

Wally Dillenbeck, Chairman of the Museum Committee reported that along with the Living Plants project that the Club is involved with, Miriam Soffer, the Museum Coordinator, is still looking forward to our July exhibit in the Lobby. We plan to comply with the request. Tabled was the issue of putting copies of the Gardener in area Libraries.

Bob Ireland is working on a revised form of the Membership Application form.

Upon the death of our member, Russ Miller, the Club was given an invitation to have its Summer Picnic at their home in Edinburgh, extended by his son. That idea and the possibility of planting a Memorial tree or bush there was tabled until our next meeting. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 9:00 pm.

Along with perennials, shrubs and trees, there are plaques that lists the names of our club members that have Gone to Rest.



Originally our club had two teams of members that would teach classes, every Wednesday, at two locations with the adults at 700 S. Pearl St. in Albany and with the children at 314 Manning Blvd in Albany, NY. COVID-19 restrictions kept us out of the building, and we're waiting to hear what the next steps are for our activities at the 700 South Pearl St. location.


